



### Safety Culture on board

At MSM, safety is paramount. The IMO emphasizes that a strong safety culture is crucial for managing safety effectively. Accidents can be prevented through correct procedures and continuous improvement. Safety culture is interconnected with overall company culture, impacting operations. "Doing things safely even when no one is looking" defines a highquality safety culture. Key components include management leadership commitment, viewing safety as a long-term investment, and inspiring a culture of safety. Implementing lasting change takes time and trust. With strong leadership, we can enhance our safety culture. Safety is a mindset that permeates our company. Together, let's prioritize safety.

#### What is Safety Culture?

The IMO addressed shipping companies: "An organization with a 'safety culture' is one that gives appropriate priority to safety and realizes that safety has to be managed like other areas of the business. ... The key to achieving that safety culture is in:

- Recognising that accidents are preventable through following correct procedure and established best practice
- Constantly thinking about safety
- Seeking continuous improvement

Safety culture is not something that a ship owner either has or does not have. All companies have *some* safety culture, all companies have a company culture, and that culture, whatever form it takes, will impact the safety of operations. pects of a company's culture are related to each other. For example, it is nearly impossible to have an excellent safety culture but have a poor culture in terms of workplace cleanliness or employee communication.

#### **Basics About Safety Culture**

One of the best definitions on safety culture is the following:

### "Doing things safely even when no one is looking or thinking"

Below are 5 key characteristics, and components, of a quality safety culture:

#### 1. Management Leadership Commitment

Safety must start at the top. Management must view safety as a long-term investment in their company, not a cost. Management should consistently and visibly inspire a culture of safety.

Even when management commit to establishing a high quality safety culture, it still takes time to implement the necessary changes, and even more time for employees to be convinced that this is a real, lasting change and not something soon to be abandoned.

Without strong, consistent and long-term leadership from the top, it is not possible to improve the quality of an organisation's safety culture.

It is important to understand that all as-

#### 2. Effective Training

Safe operations require that all personnel are competent and skilled in safe procedures, and aware of potential hazards and how to avoid them. Initial and ongoing training ensures this. Attention to training not only guarantees the above, but it also sends a strong message that management values safety and, consequently, values its employees. An employee who feels valued *will* do the right thing, even when no one is looking.

### <u>3. Measurement and Continuous Im-</u> provement

"If you don't measure it, you can't manage it."

A high quality safety culture requires measurement of safety performance. The measurements (KPIs) act as markers to inform a process of continuous improvement. Without a system of measurement there is no way to learn from mistakes, nor any way to celebrate or build on successes.

#### 4. A Focus on Learning, Not Blame

Every day there are "near misses" that represent incredible learning opportunities. An accident is a very expensive way to learn a lesson. On the other hand, a "near miss" can be a practically free way to learn, but only if the close call is reported, analysed, and turned into a learning opportunity.

The problem is that near-misses are almost never reported, unless there are more than a few witnesses, because those at fault fear repercussions. The way around this problem is to have a policy that ensures that employees are not punished for their near misses.

Near-misses should assist in reducing serious injuries, and/or accidents, and could also serve as a point of pride; knowing the report will help avoid a future accident, injury or even fatality.

### 5. Continuous Reflection and Visible Commitment to Safety

Safety and safe procedures must always be top of mind for the entire company. Measurement, continuous improvement and learning as mentioned above. But equally important is highly visible, meaningful and continuous evidence of commitment.

Some ways to demonstrate such commitment could include consistent safety messaging in the workplace, the celebration of "jobs done right" alongside the dissemination of near-miss information, and more. It must be continuously reflected upon in meaningful ways. A sign on the wall reminding people of their role in safe operations will be respected if employees believe in management's commitment to safety.

**MSM** top management is fully committed to safety and security. We have incorporated all above 5 key elements in our ISM SQA system. The SQA system needs to be "lived" by all in the offices and you on board.

### Beating the Heat at Sea: Essential Tips for Seafarers During Summer Months

## **Summer Fruit Cake**

#### Ingredients

325g butter, at room te perature, plus extra for the tins 425g caster sugar 2 tsp almond extract 1/2 lemon, finely zested 250g plain yogurt 4 large eggs, at room temperature 375g self-raising flour 225g ground almonds For the filling and to decorate 200g mascarpone 300ml double cream 1 tbsp lemon juice icing sugar, to taste, plus extra fordusting 1-2 tsp rose geranium water or rose water, to taste (see tip, below) 800g summer berries (raspberries, blackberries, redcurrants, blackcurrants, hulled strawberries and loganberries) 4 tbsp caster sugar rose geranium flowers or other edible flowers

#### Step 1

Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Butter and line the bases of three 23cm cake tins. Cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy, then add the almond extract and lemon zest. Use a fork to whisk the yogurt with the eggs. With the mixer on a low speed,

add the flour, ground almonds and 1/2 tsp salt to the butter and sugar, alternating with the yogurt and eggs.

#### Step 2

Divide the batter between the tins and bake for 35-40 mins or until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Cool in the tins for 5 mins, then turn out onto a wire rack, remove the parchment and leave to cool.

#### Step 3

Beat the mascarpone to loosen it. Whip the cream until it holds its shape. Combine the cream, mascarpone and lemon juice, then carefully add the icing sugar and flower water to taste.



#### Step 4

Assemble the cake just before serving. Toss the berries with the caster sugar. Spread the flattest cake with half the cream, then add half the fruit. Top with a second cake, spread with the rest of the cream and top with the rest of the fruit. Finish with the last cake, sift over icing sugar, then decorate with rose geranium petals and rose geranium leaves (as long as they're small).

## Summer BBQ

#### Ingredients

400g pork fillet 4 tbsp light muscovado sugar 60ml cider vinegar 1 tsp fish sauce ½ small pineapple, peeled, cored and cut into chunks (or use ready prepped fresh pineapple, drained well) 1 green pepper, deseeded and cut into squares (optional) 4 spring onions, trimmed and cut into 4 equal lengths small bunch coriander, chopped (optional) cooked rice or pitta, to serve

#### Step 1

Cut the pork into cubes. Heat the sugar and vinegar in a pan over a low heat until the sugar melts. Add the fish sauce and cool. Tip in the pork and mix well so that all the cubes are covered in sauce.

#### Step 2


Heat the barbecue. If you are using coals, wait until they turn white. If you are indoors, heat a griddle pan. Thread the pork and pineapple onto skewers, alternating pieces with the pepper and spring onion.

#### Step 3

Barbecue or griddle the skewers for 3-4 mins each side (you may need to cook them for longer if griddling). Sprinkle with coriander, if you like, then serve with rice or slide into pitta breads.


