Introducing the New MSM Safety Management System (SMS)

As part of our ongoing drive to strengthen safety, compliance, and operational excellence, Mastermind Shipmanagement has introduced a new MSM Safety Management System (SMS), aligned with the ISM Code and focused on safe ship operation and pollution prevention. On 28 November 2025, this new system was presented by Nikolas Adami to 30 MSM seafarers, mostly officers, at the LydiaMar Manila training room.

Why the System Was Updated

The maritime industry is entering a stricter and more regulated era, and our systems must evolve accordingly. Nikolas explained that the new MSM/SMS has been developed and updated in response to:

- 1. New international and industry requirements (e.g., DryBMS, RightShip, ISO updates)
- 2. The need to align with the latest best practices and expectations
- 3. The goal of improving clarity, consistency, and usability for both ship and shore personnel
- 4. Strengthening our safety culture and supporting continuous improvement
- 5. Reducing operational gaps and standardizing procedures across the fleet
- 6. Enhancing continuous monitoring and control

Key Features of the New ISM/SMS

The new ISM/SMS consists of 22 chapters, available in electronic format with a user-friendly layout for easy navigation. It is supported by more than 20 policies covering safety, quality, environmental protection, and people-related issues, ensuring compliance with ISM, MLC, and ISO standards as well as all applicable legal requirements.

The SMS is not intended to sit on the shelf; it is a practical tool that must be referenced in all onboard operations. Both ship and shore teams are expected to familiarize themselves with the updated procedures and to incorporate them into day-to-day work



Learning from Past Incidents

To highlight why such systems exist and why strict adherence is vital, Nikolas revisited the case of the M/V Herald of Free Enterprise. This incident was used to underline the core lessons that shaped the ISM Code and continue to guide our SMS today:

- Every task must have a clearly defined responsible person—no ambiguity.
- Safety-critical items require verification, checks, and cross-checks.
- Fatigue, stress, workload, and complacency directly impact safety and must be actively managed.
- A strong safety culture must be lived daily—not just written in a manual.
- High-risk ship designs demand strict controls, risk assessments, and operational discipline.
- Near misses are warnings—if ignored, they eventually become accidents.
- Clear communication and teamwork are essential to maintaining effective safety barriers.
- Operational pressure must never override safety routines—safety comes first, every time.

By reflecting on these lessons, the seminar reinforced that the new MSM/SMS is not merely a documentation exercise but a framework to prevent failures and protect lives, the environment, and assets.

Looking Ahead

The introduction of the new ISM/SMS marks an important step in our journey toward higher standards of safety, compliance, and professionalism. The expectation is clear: all forms, checklists, and procedures will change, and both ship and company must seize this opportunity to learn, adapt, and improve. By embracing the new system and the mindset behind it, we move together into a safer, more transparent, and more resilient future.

Safety is not just a policy—it is a culture.


Accounting Staff - Blaise Angela



Last September 13, the Maritime Multipurpose Cooperative (MMPC), in partnership with Lydia Mar Manila Inc., successfully hosted "Malayo Man, Malapit Din (What is distance is close) – A Parenting Seminar for Seafarer Families."

The session was led by experts from the Ateneo Center for Family Ministries (CEFAM): Dr. Cynthia Javier-Gavino, Ms. Maria Gracia Bello-Maquez, and Ms. Catherine Untalan Vital, who shared their valuable knowledge and expertise on family dynamics.

One key takeaway shared during the seminar was that research has shown that distance is not the real determinant of strong parent-child relationships. What truly matters is the quality of connection, which can still thrive even in seafaring families — thanks to today's digital tools and open communication.

The speakers also emphasized that:

- Parenting can be strengthened by using technology wisely to stay connected while minimizing risks
- Discipline should not be about punishment, but about guidance, fostering responsibility, and encouraging a growth mindset among children



The event was attended by 47 seafarers and their families, who engaged in discussions, reflections, and practical exercises. It was a safe and supportive space where participants found encouragement and tools to strengthen family bonds despite the distance.

MMPC believes that strong families build strong communities. This initiative is just one of the many ways the cooperative supports its members in navigating the unique realities of seafaring life.

Raising the Bar on Safety at Sea

New Safety Management System, Fleet Innovations, and Crew Training Presented in Manila Seminar

The new MSM Safety Management System (SMS), aligned with the ISM Code on safe ship operation and pollution prevention, was introduced by Nikolas Adami to a group of 30 MSM seafarers, mostly officers, on 28 November 2025 at the Lydia Mar Manila training room.

During the session, Nikolas outlined why the system has been updated and further developed. The main drivers behind the changes include:

- 1. Responding to new international and industry requirements (such as DryBMS, RightShip, and updated ISO standards)
- 2. Keeping MSM procedures in line with current best practices and stakeholder expectations
- 3. Making the system clearer, more consistent, and easier to use for both onboard and shore staff
- 4. Further strengthening the company's safety culture and supporting ongoing improvement
- 5. Closing operational gaps and harmonizing procedures across the fleet
- 6. Enhancing continuous monitoring and control of operations















The revised MSM/SMS is composed of 22 chapters in electronic format, designed with a user-friendly structure for quick reference. It is supported by more than 20 policies covering safety, quality, environmental protection, and people-related matters, helping to ensure compliance with ISM, MLC, ISO, and relevant legal requirements. The expectation is that the SMS will be actively used and referred to in all onboard operations.

To illustrate why such a system is essential, Nikolas revisited the case of the M/V Herald of Free Enterprise, using it as a learning example for why the ISM framework was established in the first place—primarily to prevent avoidable failures. Among the key lessons highlighted were:

- Every task must have a clearly defined person in charge—no uncertainty about responsibility
- Safety-critical items require verification, checking, and cross-checking
- Fatigue, stress, workload, and complacency are real safety risks and must be managed proactively
- Safety culture needs to be practiced daily, not just written down in manuals
- High-risk ship designs call for strict control measures, thorough risk assessments, and disciplined operations
- Near misses are early warnings—if ignored, they can turn into serious accidents
- Clear communication and teamwork are essential to maintaining intact safety barriers
- Operational pressure must never be allowed to override safety routines—safety comes first, every time

In the afternoon, Capt. Eugen-Henning Adami presented MSM's new high-tech 43,000 dwt vessels, USUKI and UMEA, focusing on their modern design features and the efficiency of the onboard systems.

Amid these fleet updates, Capt. Adami also expressed his appreciation to the Filipino crew, emphasizing that their dedication and hard work are central to MSM's achievements—a success that is shared with them and reinvested in their development and welfare.

The day concluded with Managing Director Eugen Adami and Nikolas Adami presenting to the management-level officers of M/V USUKI, together with shore support team members Capt. Tony Palenzuela, Capt. Andy Tallaafer, and Armando Domingo. They walked through MSM's detailed, advanced onboard training plan for cadets and crew on the new vessels, underlining MSM's commitment to structured learning and professional growth.

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


Victoria Loutsiou - Purchasing

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

Christmas Desserts

A stocking chock-full of sugar-coated treasures, hiding all the winter wonders of Christmas inside.

Follow these 2 recipes to make some holiday treats.

1) "Reindeer Cookies



Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup smooth peanut butter
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 72 small pretzel twists, or as needed
- ½ cup chocolate chips, or as needed


Directions:

Step 1: Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).

Step 2: Beat butter, sugar, peanut butter, eggs, vanilla extract, and salt together in a bowl until smooth and creamy. Stir flour and baking soda into creamed butter mixture until well incorporated.

Step 3: Roll dough into 36 balls. Flatten each ball and shape into an upside-down triangle. Press two pretzels into the two top corners of each triangle for the antlers. Press two chocolate chips into the center of each triangle for the eyes, and one chocolate chip or M&M on the bottom of the triangle for the nose. Arrange cookies on baking sheets.

Step 4: Bake in the preheated oven until cookies are golden brown, 10 to 15 minutes.







Ingredients:

- 2 x 320g/11½oz packets readyrolled <u>puff pastry</u>
- 50g/1¾oz <u>pesto</u>
- 80g/3oz <u>cheddar</u>, grated
- 1 free-range egg, beaten
- 2 tsp sesame seeds, optional
- salt and freshly ground <u>black</u> <u>pepper</u>, to taste



Directions:

Step 1: Preheat the oven to 180C/160C Fan/Gas 4 and line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.

Step 2: Lay the two sheets of puff pastry one on top of the other on the lined baking tray, taking care not to allow them to stick together. Cut into a long triangle shape. Cut a little stump for the end of your tree at the wider end, remove and reserve any scraps of pastry covered in the fridge.

Step 3: Carefully peel the top layer of pastry off the 'tree' and set to one side.

Step 4: Spread the pesto over the base and sprinkle with the cheese before sandwiching the base with the reserved layer of pastry to cover.

Step 5: Starting at the pointed end, using a sharp knife, cut evenly spaced lines on each side that get longer towards the base of the tree. Make sure to leave a gap running up the middle as the trunk of the tree.

Step 6: Starting on one side, take two of the strips and twist them together. Repeat on both sides.

Step 7: Remove any scraps from the fridge and, using a cutter (or just with a knife freehand) cut decorative stars, placing a large one at the top of the tree and smaller ones along the middle.

Step 8: Brush with beaten egg all over, season to taste with salt and pepper and sprinkle with the sesame seeds, if using.

Step 9: Bake in the oven for 20 minutes. Allow to cool slightly before serving.


